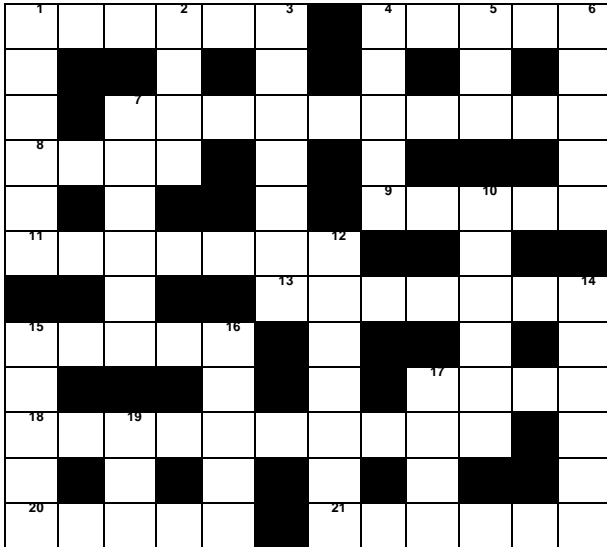

Parish Council News

The May Parish Council meeting began with the Chairman Cllr. Plumbly welcoming Andrea Mendel and Linda Smalley onto the Parish Council as a result of the recent elections. Cllr. Wood reported that a solar powered 30mph speed sign is to be installed shortly on the A137 in an effort to reduce speeding. He said that the Chelmondiston Recycling Centre closure had been delayed until the end of July to give the Council time to try to save the facility. The Council were informed that Babergh District Council had refused planning permission for the erection of a Radio Mast and CCTV cameras at Folly Farm, Main Road, Tattingstone. PC Gary Austin reported on a fairly quiet time on the Shotley Peninsular during the month of April. He said the traffic arrangements for the Great East Swim in June will be the same as last year.

The Lemons Hill Bridgewatch will be reactivated this summer but he said that Anglian Water needed to be more involved and help the police with this ongoing problem. Cllr. Wood said he has asked Simon Waters from Alton Water to have a meeting with him to discuss this matter. Cllr. Kerswell reported that four new benches have been purchased to be placed on the playing field. The edges of the playing field are still not being cut by the contractor and the committee will look into this matter again. Cllr. Collins presented the unaudited accounts for the year 2010 – 2011 to the Council and Cllr. Kerswell proposed a vote of thanks for his continuing work as R.F.O. Next meeting Monday 6th June at 7.30p.m.

Encourage runner beans up their supports and tie in. Earth up potatoes. Remove tomato side shoots. Peg down strawberry runners to make new plants. Make sure fruit is protected with netting. Thin out plums and apples. Sow outdoors broccoli, carrot, endive, French and runner beans, kale, peas, rocket, radish, spinach, spring onion, squash, chives and fennel. To reduce black fly on broad beans, remove the growing tips when the pods start to mature. Try under-cropping; use the space under tall plants to grow spinach and chard – they don't mind the shade.

SEASONAL VEG TO EAT THIS MONTH...

Asparagus, beetroot, broad beans, cabbage, carrots, garlic, globe artichoke, Japanese onion, lettuce, onion, peas, potatoes, radish, rocket, spinach, spring onion. Blackcurrants, cherries, gooseberries, raspberries, rhubarb, strawberries.
