The Alton Water Run 2011 takes place on Sunday 8th May and the Committee, of which I am the Chairman, are currently very busy organising it. Bogus Burglar Alarm Sales

Following a number of complaints, Suffolk Trading Standards are warning residents to be vigilant when opening their doors to companies offering burglar alarms for as little as a pound.

A salesperson may cold call by telephone and insist on visiting the same day to discuss the installation of a free or cheap alarm. Companies may also use high-pressure tactics to scaremonger residents.

Based on previous complaints, Trading Standards found that the companies failed to mention hidden fees for the monitoring, upkeep and rapid response facilities. Some residents have found themselves tied into a long contract agreement costing thousands of pounds.

James Garrett, Suffolk Fair Trading Officer said; "We are urging residents, especially elderly or vulnerable people, to be aware of such calls. Our advice is not to buy anything based on a cold call. If you intend to make a major purchase always research the market and get at least three quotes from reputable companies."

If residents do not wish to receive unsolicited sales and marketing telephone calls, they can register for free via the Telephone Preference Service on 0845 070 0707 or www.tpsonline.org.uk.

Local spotlight - Tattingstone in the 40's



I hope you don't mind me approaching you in this way but I am seeking information about Tattingstone in the 1940s and I was hoping that you may be able to help me or direct me to someone who can. My name is Paul Kettle and I was born in Tattingstone in 1946 but moved away shortly afterwards. I now live in Canada. Both my parents and grandparents (the Kettle and Porter families) also lived in Tattingstone for many years. My parents are now deceased and I am attempting to put together a family tree. As part of this project I wish to learn more of village life during 1945/1946, in particular the social life and events held in the village hall, sports field and village pubs (The Wheatsheaf, The White Horse and the former Off Licence that was an Annex to Mr Squirrel's shop when I was a kid, later known as Waterloo House).

I know that a lot of people were serving in the Forces and there were US Servicemen down the road at Raydon, some of whom frequented the surrounding villages and pubs but I have little idea of the extent or how they travelled backwards and forwards. I know my parents travelled to and from Martlesham Heath and as they had no car, I can only assume that public transport services must have been a lot better then. So what I am trying to do is build up a picture of life in the village during this period. The type of information I am looking for is as follows:

- How far afield did local people travel for leisure and social activities and what means of transport did they use?
- I know there was a rail station at Bentley and regular trains to and from Ipswich but what areas did the bus services serve and how easy was it to get about?
- What social events, such as dances, etc, were held in the village hall, how often and where did the attendees come from?
- What social events did villagers travel to attend outside the village and how far did they go?
- Was any transport specially provided to attend such events?
- Where any events held on the sports field and how well were they attended?
- Were the pubs thriving establishments during this period, who used them and from how far out did visitors travel?
- To what extent did US servicemen visit the village and social events and which bases did they travel from?
- Did any locals marry servicemen who were not from the village?
- Did any locals marry US servicemen and move to the USA?
- Did any US servicemen marry and eventually settle in or around the village?

I realise that I am asking a lot but I hope someone may be able to help or guide me to a source that will help. Any help given will be much appreciated however small it is. Thank you for allowing me to take up your time. *Paul*

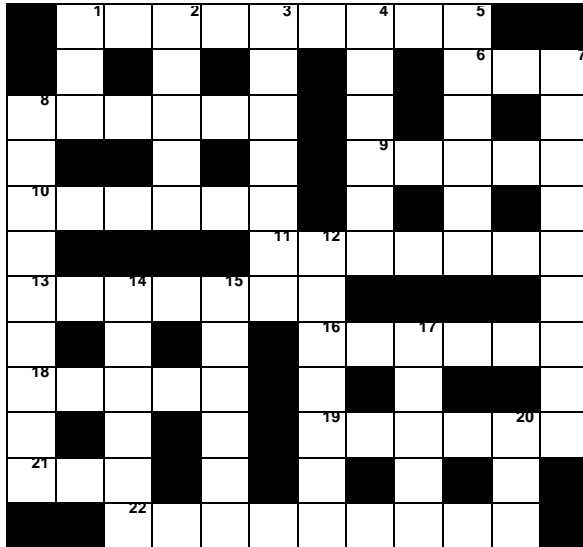

Parish Council News

At the February meeting Councillors approved revised plans for the accesses into Numbers 30 and 31 Church Road. PC Gary Austin reported that two burglaries had occurred in the village during January, a mobile phone had been stolen from a house in Church Road and a large quantity of fuel stolen from Ipswich Road. He urged people to be vigilant and said heating oil and scrap metal were the items most likely to be targeted. He said it would be a good idea to get the whole village covered by the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme as this encourages people to keep an eye out for anything suspicious. Cllr. Collins reported that he had very little feedback on the Community Speedwatch proposal and had put another item in the February newsletter.

Cllr Wood reported on the proposed cuts

which the County Council are proposing to make, one of which is to close the Recycling Centre at Chelmondiston and he urged people to sign the online petition. The date for this year's village Fete is Saturday 3rd September and the theme this year will be Transport. Cllr Kerswell reported that a fire extinguisher has been placed in the pavilion on the playing field. Football and tennis are still being played on the field weather permitting. Parish Council elections will take place on Thursday 5th May 2011. News from Babergh first, there will be a local poll regarding the proposed merger of Babergh DC and Mid Suffolk DC to form a new Council.

The poll will take place after the local elections. It will be a postal vote and every registered elector will receive a communication from the Electoral Reform Service, with a simple question are you in favour of the merger between Babergh DC and Mid Suffolk DC to form a new Council YES or NO. This will take place from 9th May – 6th June. More information will follow.

With regards the cuts from SCC I'm afraid the amendments put forward by myself and others were not accepted so the full range of cuts proposed by the administration are to be implemented. The effect it will have on residents on the Peninsula will be the loss of the Waste Re-cycling Site at Chelmondiston, no evening and weekend Bus Services, Meals on Wheels up 33%, Cuts to Wholetime Firefighters, Loss of Youth Grants youth Explore Card and Home to School Travel, plus many others.

Regards the loss of Chelmondiston Waste Site I

am having a series of meetings to see if we can keep the site open by operating ourselves but in the meantime please sign the online petition on the SCC website, as well as others. Rest assured I will be doing all I can to stave off these cuts and trying to keep services and amenities open and viable within the Peninsula.

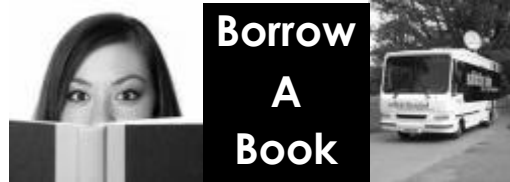

ON THE VEGGI PLOT FOR MARCH...

Busy times begin if your soil is warm enough. Seed will only germinate if the soil temperature is high enough to allow growth to begin. Weeds grow regardless! Dig in well-rotted manure or compost to help groom soil. Mulch fruit trees and bushes. Prepare asparagus bed. Sow carrot seed near garlic. This will confuse the carrot fly as the scent is stronger. Sow outdoors broad beans, Brussels sprouts (earlies), carrots (earlies), leek, lettuce, onion, parsnip, peas (main crop), radish, spinach, spring onion, turnip (earlies), hardy herbs.
