Buzabout News

The Buzabout service was rebranded on the 8th August and many people believed the service to have been terminated. It has in fact not finished but merely been re-named with a few operational time changes. In particular they wish to promote the use of the service on a Tuesday, Friday or Saturday night.

Buzabout is a public transport service on the Shotley Peninsula and runs as far as Ipswich, Copdock, Washbrook, Stratford St Mary, Holton St Mary, Great Wenham and Capel St Mary.

Anyone can use it – including those with baby buggies and wheelchairs

- It can carry up to 11 people.
- It operates between 7am – 7pm Mondays to Saturdays.
- Evening Services run on Tuesdays, Fridays & Saturdays from 7pm – midnight.
- It costs about the same as a bus fare. Bus passes are accepted during the day and there are concessionary fares for senior citizens and children in the evening.
- The service goes where you want it to go within the designated area and will pick up other people along the way.

You have to book a seat in advance. Buzabout works on a first-come-first-served basis, so the earlier you book, the more likely it is that we can find a seat for you.

- The booking lines are open between 9am – 4pm Monday to Friday.
- To book please ring Tel: 0845 458 1920
- It is advisable to book as soon as the booking lines open, 7 days in advance of travel.

Billy Morton from Suffolk ACRE said: -

“We would like more people to use the Buzabout service, especially in the evenings. Buzabout can take you as far as Ipswich train station during the day and into Ipswich town centre in the evening. So if you’re planning a night out to a pub, restaurant, cinema or theatre, we can get you there and bring you home again afterwards.

Buzabout has for many years provided transport on the Shotley Peninsula. On August 8th it changed its name to Suffolk Links Buzabout. This name change is part of a county-wide re-branding of community transport services. The services are subsidised by Suffolk County Council and known as Suffolk Links, Demand Responsive Transport Services.

Parish Council News

At the September Parish Council meeting Cllr. Collins reported that he had attended the relaunch of the Buzabout service which is to include Tattingstone. The scheme is to be operated with a new vehicle and is an on demand service, new leaflets will be delivered with the October newsletter.

Cllr. Wood reported that the Chelmondiston Recycling Centre had re-opened on 4th August and was currently running at a loss, this will be reviewed after three months. Cllr Hurley said she had received complaints from parents whose children attended the holiday play activities on the playing field in August who felt that not enough structured play was put into the event by the organizers. Cllr. Collins said another site is now

being investigated for Affordable Housing. A Community Support Officer attended the meeting and reported on two crimes in the village during August, one was theft from a vehicle in Lemons Hill car park and the second a harassment incident. The Lemons Hill swimming had not been such a problem this summer probably due to the cooler weather. Cllrs Plumbly, Chambers and Collins reported on another successful fete day on the 3rd September. The final judging for the Suffolk Village of the Year also took place on that day and the result will be known on Saturday 17th September. The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 3rd October at 7.30p.m. *Janet Ward, Parish Clerk*

There are currently two consultations being carried out by Suffolk County Council that may be of interest to local residents. The first is a consultation with regards the future of Mobile Libraries, the Council are considering reducing the service from fortnightly to monthly or every four weeks, they are also considering a reduction in stops, at present in Tattingstone we have 3 stops and 35 registered borrowers. To take part in the consultation the questionnaire can be accessed online at www.suffolk.gov.uk/sid or can be obtained from a Library Van or Library, the consultation finishes on 16th October. Early consultation has also started on next year's budget, with further savings to be made SCC is eager to hear your views. You can access this on

the SCC website or pick up a hard copy at such places as Libraries, GP surgeries or via myself you can also request a hard copy via phone or email.

Babergh DC will also be seeking residents views with regards its Local Development Framework Strategy, consultation events will be taking place locally with the nearest one to us being held at Brantham village Hall, please keep your eyes on local notice boards for dates and timings. Babergh will also be seeking nominations for its Community Achievement Awards so if you think anyone deserves recognition please obtain a form from either Babergh or the Parish Clerk.

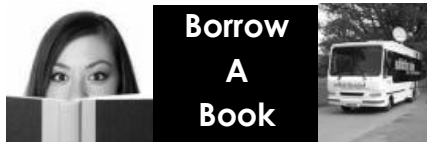

The next meeting of the Bookclub will be at Terry's-Bowman's Grove, The Heath at 8pm on October 11th. This month we are reading foreign

detective novels. We shall all be reading Michael Dibdin's last novel featuring his Italian detective, Aurelio Zen. End Games is set in a tight-knit traditional village in Calabria where Zen has to uncover the violent forces at work there bringing him into conflict with his political masters.

In addition the following books are suggested for anyone wanting to add to their reading. The Yiddish Policemen's Union by Michael Chabon-This is set in an alternative version of the present day-Sitka, Alaska, a Yiddish speaking metropolis. The hero is an alcoholic homicide detective called Myer Landsman. Chabon has re-written history so that Israel is destroyed in 1948 after the Arab-Israeli war and an alternative Jewish state set up in Alaska. The No 1 Ladies' Detective Agency by Alexander McCall Smith. These 12 novels feature the lady detective Mma Precious Ramotswe and show McCall's love of Africa (he was born in Zimbabwe) and of Botswana where his stories are set. This novel introduces Precious with her move to Gabarone after the death of her much loved father, where she sets up the first detective agency in the country to be run by a woman. She is determined to help others and to preserve the best traditions and culture of her beloved country.

A Stained White Radiance by James Lee Burke. Dave Robicheaux is the Cajun, non drinking alcoholic police detective featuring in a series of novels set in Louisiana written by Burke. The violence, crime and hidden secrets in the books is offset by the elegaic portrayals of the Louisiana landscape. In this novel Robicheaux and close friend Cletus Purcel, are drawn into painful conflicts with the powerful Sonnier family and south Louisiana's Mafia boss.

ON THE VEGGI PLOT FOR OCTOBER...

Pot Make strawberry beds and fork in plenty of well-rotted organic matter. Plant this year's potted runners. Protect winter spinach and carrots with straw. Bring tender herbs such as lemon grass indoors. Divide chives and pot to bring indoors. Plant out Broad beans, lamb's lettuce, over wintering onion sets, round seeded peas, spring cabbage. It is generally believed that parsnips and Savoy cabbage taste better after a frost. If the skin of squashes are hardened off, they store longer. When a pumpkin stem begins to show signs of splitting, it means the pumpkin has reached its mature colour. Use saved/recycled bubble wrap to insulate greenhouses and cold frames. Plant comfrey around the borders of winter cloches.

SEASONAL VEG TO EAT THIS MONTH...

Brussels sprouts, Beetroot, beans, broccoli, cabbage, carrot, cauliflower, celery, celeriac, chard, chicory, endive, Jerusalem artichoke, kohlrabi, leek, lettuce, parsnip, peas, peppers, potatoes, pumpkin, spinach, sweet corn, swede, turnip, winter radish, winter squashes. Apples, figs, pears. Hardy herbs.
